Anti-bullying advice

Bullying affects lots of young people and happens in many schools but it's the way it's dealt with which makes the difference between life being tolerable or a misery for many.

A definition of bullying

There is no legal definition of bullying. But it is usually defined as **repeated behaviour** which is **intended to hurt** someone either emotionally or physically, and is often aimed at certain people because of their race, religion, gender or sexual orientation or any other aspect such as appearance or disability. Bullying can take many forms including:

- physical assault
- verbal
- emotional
- cyber bullying

Bullying can happen anywhere: at school, travelling to and from school, in <u>sporting</u> teams, between neighbours or in the <u>workplace</u>.
